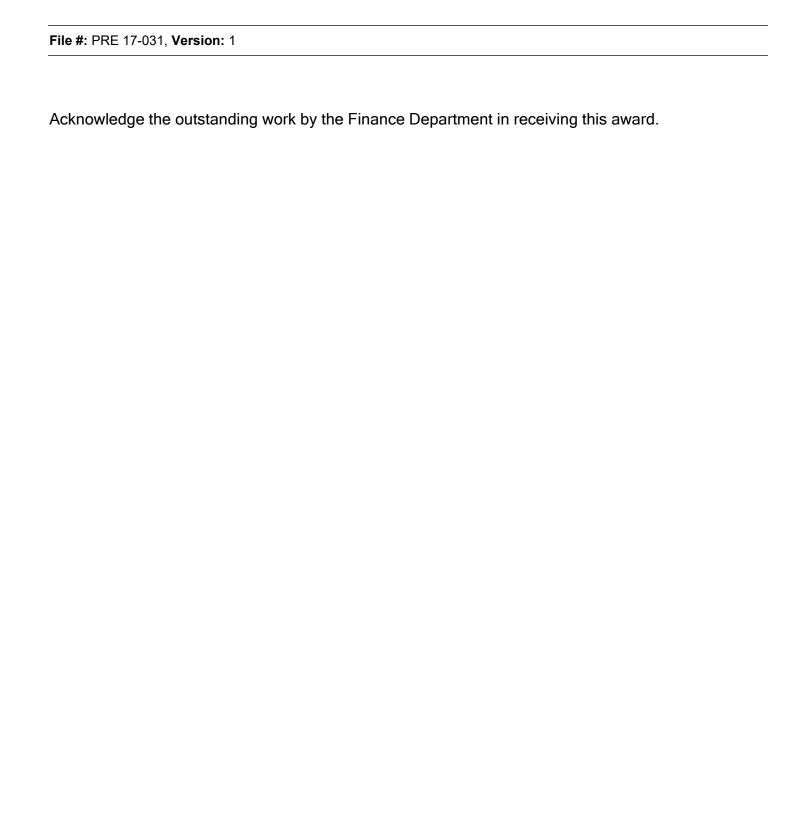

WHEREAS, the city of DEER PARK, TEXAS is committed to ensuring the safety and security of all those living in and visiting the City of Deer Park; and

WHEREAS, U.S. fire departments responded to 365,500 home fires that resulted in 2,560 civilian deaths in 2015, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA); and

WHEREAS, newer homes are built with lightweight materials that burn faster than older home constructions; and

WHEREAS, many of today's products and furnishings produce toxic gases and smoke when burned, making it impossible to see and breathe within moments; and

WHEREAS, these conditions contribute to a much smaller window of time for people to escape a home fire safely, with people having as little as one to two minutes to escape from the time the smoke alarm sounds; and

On September 5, 2017, the City Council took a record vote to begin the process of adopting an ad valorem tax rate of \$0.720000 per \$100 valuation for tax year 2017 (FY 2017-2018). This rate is unchanged from the current tax rate of \$0.720000 per \$100 valuation set by the City Council in tax year 2016 (FY 2016-2017). Because an ad valorem tax rate of \$0.720000 per \$100 valuation is greater than the effective tax rate of \$0.698346 per \$100 valuation, the State's "Truth In Taxation" laws require two (2) public hearings to be held prior to a vote to set this rate. Also on September 5, 2017, the City Council adopted an ordinance establishing the dates of those public hearings as follows:

A tax rate of \$0.720000 per \$100 valuation has been proposed for adoption by the governing body of City of Deer Park. This rate exceeds the lower of the effective or rollback tax rate, and state law requires that two public hearings be held by the governing body before adopting the proposed tax rate.

The governing body of City of Deer Park proposes to use revenue attributable to the tax rate increase for the purpose of infrastructure maintenance and improvements and public safety.

PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATED TO A SCHEDULE OF EVENTS FOR THE SALE OF CERTIFICATES OF OBLIGATION John Robuck, BOK Financial Inc., gave a presentation of the for the Certificates of Obligation, Series 2017, not exceeding 7 million dollars. The overview of the current bond market condition, summary of bids, final debt service requirements and scheduled events.

- 6. <u>DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATED TO A CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF DEER PARK AND PGAL FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES FOR THE REDESIGNING, PROGRAMMING AND PLANNING PHASES OF THE DEER PARK EMS ANNEX Emergency Services Director, Robert Hemminger advised the Council of the Request for Qualifications that solicited qualifications for architectural services to design a new Fire Department/ EMS Annex. A committee consisting of the Assistant City Manager, Public Works Director, Emergency Services Director, Fire Chief, and two firefighters sat on the FCPEMSD Board and reviewed solicitation responses from 16 proposals. They were scored relatively to their qualifications. The top six firms were interviewed and again scored, resulting in a final ranking. The top-ranked firm being PGAL Inc.</u>
- 7. DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATED TO A PROPOSED CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF DEER PARK AND THE UNIVERISTY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT HOUSTON FOR MEDICAL DIRECTOR SERVICES Emergency Services Director, Robert Hemminger, advised the Council of the results from the Committee after interviewing four candidates for the Medical Director. Dr. Richard Bradley, as part of the University of Texas Health Science Center, was the top ranking candidate. Dr. Bradley is a professor of Emergency Medicine and currently serves as the Chief of Emergency Medical Services and Disaster Medicine at the University of Texas Health Science Center Medical School. He also currently serves as Medical Director for the City of Pearland in a similar agreement.
- 8. <u>DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO THE CITY OF DEER PARK EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS GUIDE, A NEW PUBLICATION</u> Emergency Service Director, Robert Hemminger presented Council with the new Emergency Preparedness Guide. This new pocket guide was modeled after previous versions and updated through the combined efforts of Kristen Edwards, Public Relations/Marketing Specialist and Emergency Management office. This guidebook was funded through a combined effort of Hazard Mitigation Grant funds and the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC). The guidebooks are available to citizens (free of charge) at various City buildings.
- DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING THE CITY'S INVESTMENT PROGRAM, INCLUDING THE ANNUAL REVIEW OF THE CITY'S INVESTMENT POLICY Finance Director, Donna Todd, advised Council that in compliance with the Texas Public Funds Investment Act, Government Code Ch. 2256 as amended (the "Act"), the City has adopted an Investment Policy, which is Chapter 2, Administration, Article VII (Finance), Division 2 (Investment Policy), Section 2-274 Reporting, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Deer Park. The Act also requires that the City Council, not less than annually, adopt a written instrument stating that it has reviewed the Investment Policy and Investment Strategies. The written instrument must record any changes made to the policy or strategies. The City received notice of the two year recertification that expires September 2020. All changes are to be incorporated in the final approved ordinance.

- 10. <u>DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO THE CITY WEBSITE RE-DESIGN AND USABILITY STUDY</u> Information Technology Director, James Lewis, advised Council of the Website Committee's updates. strategies for making the most effective use of the City's website focusing on the latest innovation and user satisfaction. The committee has staff members representing all departments across the City. The role of the Committee is to examine strategies for making the most effective use of the City's website focusing on the latest innovation and user satisfaction. Paul Kurtz, IT Business Analyst, gave an overview on the layout of the new proposed website and advised Council of the tentative go live date of December 14, 2017. Kristen Edwards, Public Relations/Marketing Specialist, gave an overview of the usability study and highlighted the new and updated content that will be integrated onto the new website. Ms. Edwards also advised Council of the award received from the Texas Association of Municipal Information Officers for this website assessment.
- 11. <u>DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO POTENTIAL ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENT TO ALLOW HELIPORTS/HELISTOPS IN THE HIGHWAY DISTRICT ZONING DISTRICT</u> Randy Stockwell advised Council of his interest in opening a short-term Emergency Care Clinic on property he owns in Deer Park located near the northeast corner of East Boulevard and 13th Street. This property is zoned Highway District (HD). Officials with the Clinic indicated they would like the property to have a heliport also referenced in Code as a helistop. They have even offered to allow the City of Deer Park and Deer Park Volunteer Fire Department to utilize this heliport for emergency medical airlifts when necessary. A hospital is allowed in HD Zoning, but a heliport or helistop which serves as an accessory use to the hospital presently is not allowed. If Council desires to seek this Zoning Ordinance change, the formal process begins by having the matter referred to the Planning & Zoning Commission for their recommendation.
- 12. DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO AN EVALUATION OF THE GOLF

 COURSE BRIDGE City Manager, James Stokes, advised Council of the historic bridge at
 The Battleground Golf Course, located between the #18 green and the #1 tee boxes, is
 structurally sound due to its rehabilitation in 2012, but it's superstructure (the top section) is
 in very poor shape. That portion of the bridge was built over a century ago. Its aesthetical
 value remains, but the ironwork is full of rust and decay. The Golf Course Committee
 recently heard a presentation from RPS Engineers (formerly Klotz Associates) related to the
 bridge. RPS officials recommended conducting a study of the bridge to evaluate its options,
 which could include repairing the existing superstructure; removing and rebuilding the
 superstructure; or removing and not replacing the superstructure. They propose analyzing
 these options from an engineering perspective, as well as conducting historic research on the
 bridge to ensure it is properly preserved. The fee for these services is \$10,590.00, and may
 be funded through Hotel Occupancy Tax proceeds. The Golf Course Committee has
 recommended Council approve this action. "Mr. Jonathan Griffin with RPS is in attendance
 to address any questions you may have regarding this matter."

Mr. Griffin commented, "We had a meeting at the Battleground Golf Course to discuss the historic relevance of the bridge, possible repair or removing the bridge. As part of our discussion, it was decided to do the historic research first and then determine what the options were. There are several things that could happen with this bridge due to it being on the historic inventory. We decided to put together a proposal to present all the legal documentation and a letter to report along with a visit to discuss potential options. This is

what we hope to be part one of two parts service to the City. We would like to continue to prepare any kind of design and to do the research work for the City.

Councilwoman Sinor asked, "If we approve this tonight, will there be thirty days before it gets approved?

Mr. Griffin responded, "Yes. It would be thirty days from when we sign the contract."

Councilwoman Garrison asked, "You are going to give us three options, one being to tear it down completely?"

Councilwoman Sinor commented, "Just the top part, the bottom is solid."

Mr. Griffin answered, "The bottom is brand new with a solid structure. We do not know exactly what we can do yet. That is part of why we are proposing to investigate the options. We understand there are three potential options."

Councilwoman Garrison commented, "It has no historic value to the City, except it was built in 1892, the same year Deer Park was founded. This was brought here to Deer Park on a whim and has cost us thousands of dollars. If you come back and tell us it will cost half a million dollars to fix this bridge, I will be very much against it. I cannot see spending any more money on this bridge."

Mr. Griffin, "That is what we are trying to present to you, the options that can be done. We can work out potential options in a face to face meeting."

Councilwoman Garrison commented, "If I remember correctly, it cost us \$300,000 to do what we did before. I can't imagine what it would cost now. Just for the record, this does not make me happy."

Mr. Griffin commented, "We want to make you happy and figure out what we can do with this bridge. It is an eyesore. That's what this proposal is all about."

Mayor Mouton commented, "We will not know until we approve it."

Councilwoman Garrison, "I understand and I think it will be an interesting investigation."

Mr. Stokes, commented, "It has almost rusted through. The day is going to come sooner than later where something may happen. We can pay money to remove the top part and not build it back, but either way, it is going to cost us money."

Councilwoman Sinor asked, "The real question is what will keep us from continuing to spend money on this bridge?"

Mr. Stokes responds, "I think this is a good starting point."

Councilman Harrison, "Are there going to be options, but not a dollar amount attached to these options?"

Mr. Griffin responds. "Correct. Not yet."

Mayor Mouton, "Are you going to come up with an estimate?"

Mr. Griffin responds, "We can come up with an estimate for each option."

Councilwoman Garrison asked, "Is that going to be included in the same price of \$10,500?"

Mr. Griffin replied, "Yes it is."

Councilman Harrison commented, "You want us to make a decision without us having a clue as to what the dollar amount is going to be. We will then have to write a spec and put this out to bid which will cost additional money. We will have to make our minds up way down the road of which option we want."

Councilwoman Sinor commented, "I understood from the Golf Committee meeting, that we would have real options, knowing what we were dealing with. Not just what we could do, but what those options are and how much it would cost."

Mr. Griffin responded, "The original proposal was expanded to include a repair versus replace option. In the meeting, we decided to scale it back and make it about the historic research. We can then come back and add on to it later. We already have an idea about what the design costs would be to repair it, replace it or remove it."

Mayor Mouton asked, "Until we hire you and vote to do that, all this is just hypothetical discussion?"

Mr. Griffin, "Yes, with this proposal you will have the legal documentation to pursue whatever course of action you want."

Mayor Mouton commented, "We are not agreeing to anything yet, we are just agreeing to have the research done to give us the options."

Councilman Patterson commented, "Will part of this tell us what we are allowed to do?"

Councilwoman Garrison asked, "I am still confused about this. Are you going to give us prices and estimates of costs?"

Mr. Griffin replied, "Yes."

Councilman Patterson commented, "If they come back and say we can tear it down, then we could just tear it down."

Councilwoman Sinor commented, "Just the top half, not the whole bridge."

Mr. Griffin commented, "What we propose is to have a face to face meeting to discuss all the options which will allow us to present a new scope of work or design."

Councilwoman Sinor asked, "Is that presented back to our Committee?"

Mr.Griffin answered, "Yes."

Councilman Harrison asked, "When we made the decision to put the pilings underneath that bridge and permanently secure it, we had estimates to repair the above structure of the bridge. I am sure we still have those proposals somewhere. That was many years ago, it has deteriorated since then, If I remember correctly, the estimates were not cheap."

Mr. Griffin responded, "You have to think about the material costs and the amount of steel that is involved."

Councilman Harrison asked, "Is the bridge a safety factor the way it is right now?"

Mr. Griffin responded, "The bridge itself may not be, but the trusses could be. That is what we were asked to look at."

Mr. Stokes commented, "In regards to Councilman Harrison's question, the bridge was evaluated in regards to restoring what was already there, not the removing of the bridge and building it back."

Councilman Harrison commented, "We are talking about restoring the upper part of the bridge, if it's not too far gone."

Councilwoman Sinor commented, "We keep talking about this being a historical bridge, but by the time we replace everything on it, the bridge will not be historical anymore."

Mr. Griffin commented, "It actually has been somewhat rehabilitated. I believe on the north side of the bridge, there were two verticle members that were replaced."

13. <u>DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO MONUMENT SIGNS WITHIN THE WAY</u> FINDING PROGRAM – Parks & Recreation Director, Charlie Sandberg advised Council of the vandalism and damage done to some signs in the parks. The Way Finding Committee is seeking guidance from the Council on several options of new monuments signs for the parks. Assistant Parks & Recreation Director, Jacob Zuniga commented, "The first option is the vinyl option. It would be a retrofit to the existing four signs."

Councilwoman Sinor commented, "They are peeling the vinyl."

Mr. Sandberg replied, "Correct. To repair the four with the vinyl, it will cost \$2700. This is just the first option."

Mr. Steve Startzell of NSP, commented, "The vinyl will still be the same and can easily be replaced."

Mr. Sandberg commented, "The second option is a high pressure laminate. It is the same structure but it will have a sub straight that will be attached to which will go against the stone. This is a very secure product, but it is an additional \$4,000. We are looking at \$16,000 to replace all four."

Mr. Startzell commented, "This sub straight will have to be built. The laminate comes in two pieces and the arch is actually laminate as well. It will not have vinyl. The added expense lies in the building of the sub straight which will have to be done out of aluminum. The laminate itself is vandalism proof. It is a very hardened laminate and even if it was spray painted, it could be washed off. It is very durable and very popular for parks in general. The positives is that it would keep the same look."

Mr. Sandberg commented, "On the first option, it is aluminum on the casing. This second option is made of steel, a tougher product. This third option is a new concept for all the monuments. This a new design made of the same high pressure laminate but is recessed into the stone."

Assistant City Manager Gary Jackson, "Will that be done for the same cost?"

Mr. Sandberg, "Yes, for the same cost."

Mayor Mouton asked, "For the new signs?"

Mr. Sandberg responded, "Correct."

Mayor Mouton asked, "Are they basically indestructible?"

Mr. Sandberg answered, "Correct."

Councilman Patterson asked, "We are talking about the new four signs here, but will the old signs still have to be repaired?"

Mr. Sandberg responded, "That is correct."

Councilman Patterson asked, "They can't tear these signs up?"

Mr. Sandberg responded, "Correct. It would be the choice we recommend."

14. <u>DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2017-18 FINAL</u>

BUDGET – Finance Director, Donna Todd, advised Council of the Final Budget to include a f — ew minor changes. Basically, in the General Fund, the total increase of \$46,470 is to be funded by prior year revenue, \$5,469 for additional personnel costs related to recent reclassifications, \$20,856 to cover TMRS for part-time staff expected to exceed the 1,000 hour threshold, and \$20,145 of capital outlay for budgeted projects that will not be completed in the current fiscal year. Special Revenue Funds have a total increase of \$189,150 to be funded by the prior year revenue of the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund, \$169,150 for budgeted wayfinding signs that will not be completed in the current fiscal year, \$5,000 for host fees for the Texas Non-Profit Theater Festival, and \$15,000 for consulting services related to the Golf Course Bridge. The Water and Sewer Fund total increase of \$50,000 is to be funded by fund reserves, there is an addition to the contingency in contemplation of possible effects from Hurricane Harvey that are unknown at this time.

Capital Improvements have a total increase of \$100,000 to be funded by fund reserves, representing expenditures for budgeted sidewalks that will not be completed in the current fiscal year. Also, there is an \$1800 transfer from the Water Sewer to the General Funds, it was a salary based transfer. This will move the monies into the transfer and reduce the amount of prior year revenue.

10. COMMENTS FROM THE AUDIENCE –

- a. Carol Greer, 2306 Kilkenny Lane, commented, "I am here to talk on behalf of the people who are suffering from the flooding and the rain. Several people have talked to me about what they can do to try to get some relief. There are many people, especially the ones in the apartments that are having to pay for an apartment they can not inhabit. It is getting to the point where it is causing health issues for many of them and they are seeking some relief. We thought we could come to you and maybe you could get a committee together to find out who they are and where they are. We are a generous community and I think we could get people involved to try to help. People that manage these apartments should have a contingency fund. FEMA at this point could take a long time for these people to get back in their apartments. Meanwhile, they are having to pay rent and they can't stay there. If we could do something to help these people, I am sure they would appreciate it. Children who live in these apartments or who are not able to get back in their apartment, will be effected in their schooling. We are here to plead, please help us do something for these people. I will be willing to be on a committee and many people are willing to jump in. Nothing has been done after two weeks. Apartments have been seen, but no help has been given to them. Thank you."
- b. James Schneider, 2313 Kilkenny Lane, commented, "Mayor and Councilmembers, let me thank you first for your help with this matter. You have been on Facebook with my wife Christine Schneider. She wanted to be here tonight, but she is ill and couldn't make it. I am retired from the military after 24 years of active duty. I was stationed in Fort Hood and

came down on quick orders to West Point. We owned a home in Copperas Cove and we decided to rent the home. During the time we rented the home, we had to have a contingency plan. We hired a management company to lease the home. Before we could list it, we had to do all the repairs like as if we were going to sell it. The company that we used had us set up two accounts, an emergency account and a general account for repairs. These accounts were maintained throughout the lease. If anything happened, they would come in and fix it for us. My point is, these big corporate apartments, they do not have anything. I know they have covered and tarped the roofs. For example, my daughter's apartment, their ceiling came down in their son's bedroom. It has been vacant since the hurricane hit and they have been living with us. They haven't done anything to clean up the mess and there is still drywall on the floor where mold is now growing. They do not have an emergency contingency plan to fix it or to make it livable and habitable. In the meantime, she is still paying rent. People are paying rent for the apartments they cannot live in. They are not moving at all on these apartments. I just wanted for you to take a look into this matter and see if you could do anything about it. My wife would be willing to be on the committee as well. Thank you."

Mayor Mouton commented, "This is not an issue that is on the agenda so legally, we can not discuss this scenario. It is an issue that we are aware of and the school district is aware of. There have been things done to the best of our ability. It was a rain event and everyone is dealing with it the best way they can. After the meeting, you can get with City Manager James Stokes and City Attorney Jim Fox to discuss some of the scenarios we have been working on in that regard."

Summary: A contract for construction of the Deer Park Animal Shelter and Adoption Center was awarded to Construction LTD on May 5, 2016 for \$2,240,668, well below the architect's opinion of probable cost on February 21, 2017 of \$3,016,796.

Construction LTD was issued a notice to proceed (NTP) on July 5, 2017 for the construction of the new Deer Park Animal Shelter and Adoption Center. The contractor installed the foundation subgrade comprised of select fil and began drilling the bell bottom piers when they encountered a wet sand layer that caused the bell piers to collapse. Thinking that it might be a pocket of sand instead of a layer they tried a couple of other location and found the same layer. They canceled the installation of the bell piers and requested the structural engineer redesign the pier system taking into account the sand layer and water table. The structural engineer looked at a couple different options and recommended cased straight shaft piers. Drilling a larger diameter straight shaft and casing them until the steel and concrete is placed is considerably more expensive.

Attached is change order amount for the revised pier installation is \$102,370.50, bringing the new contract amount to \$2,343,038.50.

The Deer Park Development Corporation is responsible for administering the proceeds of the dedicated Type B economic development sales and use tax for public park purposes and events. While this development corporation has the power to expend the proceeds of the Type B sales tax for purposes authorized by the Development Corporation Act and the voters, City Council retains authority to approve all programs and expenditures of the corporation.

The City Council appoints a board of seven (7) directors of the corporation. On June 2, 2015 City Council approved Ordinance 3723 appointing 7 members to the Deer Park Community Development Corporation for a term of one or two years. The 7 appointees were: Sue Mauk, T. J. Haight, Scott Sotelo, Jeff Lawther, Doug Burgess, Brad Wells, and Georgette Ford. The Council did not specify which members would have one or two year terms. On August 18, 2015 the DPCDC held its organizational meeting, approved bylaws, elected officers and drew lots to select positions on the Board pursuant to Sec. 2.1 of the Board bylaws which states:

"2.1 Number, Appointment, and Term of Office. The business and affairs of the corporation shall be managed by a board of seven (7) directors (the "Board"). Directors shall be appointed by the City Council, and at least three (3) directors must not be employees, officers, or members of the City Council. Each member of the Board shall serve at the pleasure of the City Council for a term of two years. Places 1, 3, 5, and 7 will be appointed in odd- numbered years, and Places 2, 4, and 6 appointed in even numbered years. The initial directors shall draw lots to determine places. Terms begin on October 1 of each year."

The places drawn were as follows: Sue Mauk, Position 1; T. J. Consideration of and action on a referral to the Planning and Zoning Commission to request amending the zoning ordinance to allow heliports or helistops as an accessory use for medical facilities in commercial districts via a specific use permit.

Summary:

This item follows a discussion Council held at the September 19, 2017 City Council Workshop. At that time, Council heard from Mr. Randy Stockwell who desires to open a short-term emergency care clinic in Deer Park. He and his business partners had planned to include a heliport or helistop as an accessory use to this facility. However, at present City Code does not allow heliports or helistops in commercial zoning districts. Rather, the City's Zoning Ordinance allows heliports and helistops only by specific use permit in the M-1 or M-2 zoning districts. At the conclusion of the discussion, Council indicated a desire to assist with establishing this Zoning Ordinance change, provided any helistop or heliport allowed in a commercial zoning district be permitted only as an accessory use, and only with a specific use permit. With this action, Council is referring this matter to the Planning & Zoning Commission for their recommendation. The Commission will give its recommendation, which then will be followed by having the Commission and City Council hold a Joint Public Hearing on the matter. Afterward, Council may take action to decide final disposition of the request. Below is the proposed schedule of events for this matter:

Staff is requesting the purchase from Vaught Services, LLC, through the The Interlocal Purchasing System (TIPS) to perform the rehabilitation of a 24" Storm Sewer Line on Eastwind Dr. The project consists of rehabilitating 150lf of collapsed 24" storm drain pipe that runs from Eastwind Dr. between two houses and into an outfall ditch in the rear of the property. The line will be rehabilitated to a new HDPE line. The purchase agreement with Vaught Services, LLC is in the amount of \$177,066.75. This damage is part of Hurricane Harvey and will be part of any reimbursement package requested through FEMA.

Dear TIPS Member,

As the victims of Harvey are in our thoughts and prayers, at The Interlocal Purchasing System aka TIPS, we know that that road to recovery will be difficult for all of you affected. One of the questions everyone asks is, "What must we do now to recover?" Unfortunately, it is not as easy as just calling restoration and construction companies to come and fix the damage.

The statutory requirements of procurement in Texas are still in force, and as this is a <u>FEMA</u> Disaster Declaration, federal procurement rules under 2 CFR part 200 are in effect. Texas law and federal regulations provides for emergency purchases that bypass the usual procurement requirements in order to safeguard health and safety of students and staff, and to prevent further damage and conserve your assets that are left. If you need help with board action to approve an emergency, please contact you attorney to help you through that process. However, you must use caution in your use of those provisions. They are only for truly emergent situations. One of the ways to get recovery help quickly, without having to resort to the emergency provisions, is to utilize existing TIPS purchasing cooperative contracts. They meet the Texas statutory requirements and many will meet the Federal requirements, but you must receive confirmation from TIPS on the specific vendor's compliance with 2 CFR Part 200, commonly called EDGAR.

The purpose of the TIPS Program shall be to obtain substantial savings for participating School District, University, College, Community College, City, County or Other Public Agencies through cooperative purchasing.

Roles of the TIPS Purchasing Cooperative:

- 1. Provide for the organizational structure of the program.
- 2. Provide staff for efficient operation of the program.
- 3. Promote marketing of the TIPS Program.
- 4. Coordinate the Competitively Bid Process for all Vendor Awarded Contracts.
- 5. Provide members with procedures for placing orders through TIPS PO System.
- 6. Maintain filing system for Due Diligence Documentation.

Role of the Public Entity:

This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the Parties hereto with respect to the matters covered by its terms, and it may not be modified in any manner without the express written consent of the Parties.

If any term(s) or provision(s) of this Agreement are held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remainder of the provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

The Parties to this Agreement expressly acknowledge and agree that all monies paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be paid from budgeted available funds for the current fiscal year of each such entity.

Before any party may resort to litigation, any claims, disputes or other matters in question between the Parties to this Agreement shall be submitted to nonbinding mediation.

No Party to this Agreement waives or relinquishes any immunity or defense on behalf of themselves, their directors, officers, employees, and agents as a result of its execution of this Agreement and performance of the functions and obligations described herein.

This Agreement may be negotiated and transmitted between the Parties by means of a facsimile machine and the terms and conditions agreed to are binding upon the Parties.

Authorization:

Region VIII Education Service Center and The Interlocal Purchasing System (TIPS) Program have entered into an Agreement to provide cooperative purchasing opportunities to public agencies.
