- 1. <u>MEETING CALLED TO ORDER</u> Mayor Mouton called the workshop to order at 6:30 p.m.
- 2. EXECUTIVE SESSION (551-087) POTENTIAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVES TO A BUSINESS PROSPECT Mayor Mouton recessed the meeting at 6:30 p.m. for an Executive Session.
- 3. RECONVENE Mayor Mouton reconvened the workshop meeting at 6:50 p.m.
- 4. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO A SCHEDULE OF EVENTS FOR THE SALE OF CERTIFICATES OF OBLIGATION John Robuck of BOK Financial Securities, Inc. gave a presentation of the \$2,700,000 Certificate of Obligation, Series 2017 and highlighted the current market condition, estimated debt service requirements and a schedule of events. (Exhibit A1-A4)
- 5. PRESENTATION OF THE RENOVATIONS OF PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT AT NEDITH PARK PARKS AND RECREATION Parks and Recreation Director Scott Swigert provided a video of the improvements at Nedith Park. He thanked the Council for attending the Nedith Park dedication.
- 6. <u>DISCUSSION OF ITEMS RELATED TO THE WIDENING OF HARRIS COUNTY</u>

 FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT CHANNEL B-112-00 Public Works Director Bill Pedersen advised Council that in 2007, the city issued General Obligation Bonds and Certificates of Obligation for infrastructure projects including drainage. Due to over ten

inches of rain received during Tropical Storm Erin in August 2007, staff began to identify flood prone areas throughout the city based on FEMA repetitive losses and local structural losses. In 2010, an additional \$8 million in Certificates of Obligation were sold for drainage projects. Council selected the Patrick's Bayou Detention project as the top project and reserved bond funds for the project. In addition to the bond funds, in April 2009 the City submitted an application for a Hazard Mitigation Grant (HMGP) for additional funding for the project. In order to qualify for the FEMA grant, the city also constructed offsite drainage projects to achieve a required Benefit Cost Analysis (BCA). The design and construction of these projects were paid for out of the bond funds. There is approximately \$2.5 million remaining out of the 2010 issue. Another project identified by Council was the Harris County Flood Control District Ditch B-112-00, that is east of and parallel to East Boulevard. In 2007, a preliminary drainage study was prepared that identified five obstructions and restrictions that need to be addressed to lower the water surface elevation in the channel. Four of the five obstructions/restrictions items have been completed by the City. The only item remaining is the most costly of everything which is the reconfiguration of the channel cross section. The first part of that, is to identify the right of ways, its ownership, how much right of way we have to work with and do we have to require additional right of way to achieve what we are looking for.

Councilwoman Garrison asked, "How many different properties are we talking about?"

Walter Smith of Arborleaf Engineering & Surveying commented, "Some of the ditches within a right of way was conveyed to the City of Deer Park and some are conveyed to the Harris County Flood District. Then are one or two pieces that we are not sure of. There's a ditch there, we don't know who owns the right of way. With parcels that make up the right of way, it covers fifteen to twenty properties. We will be surveying the existing right of ways and looking at the adjacent properties to see if a widening is needed."

Councilman Patterson asked, "When the ditch was built, was the right of way determined then?"

Mr. Smith commented, "Yes, but the flood control district can't give us the deeds that created it. On the part the City of Deer Park owns, we will have an agreement and convey those to the Flood Control as well. If we have to widen them, we will do that then."

Councilman Patterson asked, "Does the HCFCD have any funds to help us do this?"

Mr. Pedersen answered, "We have met with them twice. They currently don't have any funding available for this project. They are willing to work with us if we have the funding."

7. <u>DISCUSSION ON AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF ONE (1) 2017 FRAZER REMOUNT AMBULANCE</u> – Emergency Services Director Robert Hemminger advised the Council the Fire Control, Prevention, and Emergency Medical Services District's (FCPEMSD) FY 2016-2017 budget calls for an existing ambulance "box" to be refurbished and remounted onto a new chassis. The Staff received a quote of \$138,050

via the HGAC Purchasing Cooperative for the project, inclusive of a trade-in of the existing chassis. The total cost of this project exceeds budgeted FCPEMSD funds by \$14,000. The FCPEMSD Board of Directors will meet in January to amend the FY 2016-2017 budget.

8. DISCUSSION OF ISSUES RELATING TO WYNFIELD ESTATES HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION'S REQUEST TO INSTALL NEW SIGNAGE IN WYNFIELD ESTATES SUBDIVISION - City Manager Jay Stokes advised Council Christina Ridings, Board President of the Wynfield Estates Homeowners Association (HOA) recently approached staff with a request to upgrade street signage within their subdivision. The HOA is willing to fund the improved signage and posts, which were quoted at \$6,732.00.

Councilwoman Garrison commented, "Our only concern is that the HOA understands they will be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the signs."

Ms. Ridings answered, "We know it's our responsibility to purchase, install and maintain the signs."

ADJOURN - Mayor Mouton adjourned the workshop meeting at 7:15 p.m. 9.


